This is the result of a thorough consultation process that began with a series of workshop and drafting group meetings, and was completed by the recent web survey. We had an excellent response to the survey, receiving 147 replies from staff and, including Friends and other stakeholders, a total of over 400.

The results gave us confidence that the statement proposed in the survey was broadly right but a

significant number of people, particularly staff, suggested that Kew's research work should be recognised. This point has been included in the new statement, and it helps to distinguish Kew and Wakehurst Place from the other organisations involved with plants and conservation.

The mission will be the backbone of our future planning and we are now working on a series of core strategies that follow through from the statement.

SAPP project helps optimise pesticidal plants in Southern Africa

Scientists from Malawi, Zimbabwe and Zambia were at Kew between 22 - 25 January 2007 to initiate the new Southern African Pesticidal Plants (SAPP) Project with colleagues from Kew and NRI (Natural Resources Institute-University of Greenwich). Professor David Hall of NRI said that Stephen Nyirenda from Department of Agriculture, Malawi "had been worried about the misuse of poisonous plants for pest management in Malawi for ages, and wanted to do something about it". Phil Stevenson (NRI & Kew) and Steve Belmain (NRI) built a team including Steve Davis and Monique Simmonds of the Sustainable Uses Group in the Jodrell and other scientists from Zimbabwe, Malawi & Zambia. The project is an agricultural research and training initiative financed by the EU through the SADC to optimize sustainable use of pesticidal plants in Southern Africa. The workshop was an opportunity for the partners

to discuss and plan project activities. Plants with pesticidal properties provide poor African farmers with an effective and lowcost pest control tool for vegetable production, stored grain and livestock. But the plants can be toxic - especially the papilionoid legumes that are used for this purpose - so may present health risks to users and consumers. Over-harvesting of some species threatens the diversity of local habitats too. So the project will study how the plants work, develop improved application, harvesting and cultivation techniques and provide health and safety guidelines for users. Their cultivation will generate additional cash for poor farmers and markets developed for these plants will promote conservation across the region by reducing the pressure of wild plant collecting.

Changes in the IT department - service improvements

The IT department is going through the services provided by the IT a period of change at present which will undoubtedly have an effect on everyone at some stage in the near future. I would like to take this opportunity to update everyone on the progress to date and share with you our short-term plans as they currently stand. Hot Issues - Over the last two months there have been a number of major incidents which have had a significant impact on the network and

department. The solution for some of these problems is evident while for others it is not. Recent changes applied to an already complex and fragile environment have resulted in reports of workstations regularly "freezing" and severe network performance issues across most of the organisation. Having exhausted internal options, we currently have a specialist consultant in on a shortterm assignment, looking into the

root cause of the underlying problems and hope to have a solution in place over the coming week. I sincerely apologise for the inconvenience this has caused and thank you all for your continued patience.

Service Desk - We have recently made some changes to the structure of the IT department and introduced a Service Desk to better service our users. The original Helpdesk number x5713 is being phased out and has been replaced

with extension 2209. Unlike the original Help Desk number which was manned by a single individual, x2209 is menu driven and will direct you to the correct team to assist you with your query. We now have a total of six dedicated support analysts across all of our technology platforms and are accepting calls between the hours of 8am and 6pm. In addition we are also investigating possible options for providing limited

emergency cover on weekends.

Change to retirement age at RBG Kew Crocus tommasinianus

The Employment Equality (Age) Regulations (" the regulations") came into effect on 1 October 2006, making it unlawful to discriminate either directly or indirectly (except in very limited circumstances) against workers, employees, job seekers and trainees because of their age. The regulations cover recruitment, terms and conditions, promotions, transfers, dismissals and training, and in preparation for this legislation, Human Resources have been reviewing all our policies and processes to ensure compliance with the regulations. This review has included consideration of our policy on retirement age.

The normal and contractual retirement age for all staff is currently 60. Under the regulations, however, employers are able to set a retirement age of 65 or above or remove the retirement age altogether, but not to maintain a retirement age below 65 except in very limited circumstances. This will policy, but pension age is determined by the Cabinet Office and is specified in the rules of the Principal Civil Service Pension Scheme (PCSPS)


The rules of the PCSPS are currently being considered by the Cabinet Office, and although the pension age will remain at 60 for current scheme members, it is likely to increase to 65 for staff joining the scheme in the future. A date for this change has not yet been announced, but it is unlikely to be implemented before 1 April 2007.

Our revised policy of retirement age

Retirement age at the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew will now be fixed at 65. Staff have the flexibility, therefore, to elect to retire when they wish between the ages of 60 and 65, and will be able to continue working until the date they wish to retire, subject, of course, to normal criteria of satisfactory performance and

Staff in post before 1 October 2006 will retain the option of retiring at age 60, and they will be able to take their pension with no actuarial reduction in their benefits. So for the time being there may, in practice, continue to be a pattern of retirement at 60, though with no obligation to that effect. Staff will, therefore, be contacted by HR well in advance of their 60th birthday to discuss their retirement plans and to provide details of where to obtain advice regarding their pension. Alternatively, they may, of course, decide to retire and take their pension after age 60. These arrangements will also apply to staff joining the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew on or after 1 October 2006 but before the date on which any change to the PCSPS rules is implemented – including the expected increase in pension age to 65.

Exceptionally mild temperatures through November, December and January have enticed spring bulbs to flower earlier than usual. Crocus tommasinianus normally provides the first welcome touches of colour between the second and third weeks of January. This year, Curator, Nigel Taylor found open

Retirement age and pension age This communication announces a change in our retirement age but not in the pension age: retirement age is when staff would normally retire; pension age is when staff could draw their pension with no actuarial reduction in their benefits. The two ages are only linked to the extent that one cannot normally draw a pension before actually retiring. The Royal Botanic Gardens,

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fulfilment of their employment contract.

To maintain business continuity, the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew will obviously need to have reasonable advance warning of when staff wish to retire if doing so before the age of 65. Staff who wish to retire between the ages of 60 -65 will therefore be expected to give at least 3 month's notice of their intention to retire, by way of a resignation. This notice will also help ensure that arrangements can be made for the pension and superannuation lump sum to be paid on time.

actuarial adjustments, will be made available to staff as soon as the Cabinet Office provides firm guidance.

This change in our retirement age policy, which has been agreed with the Trade Unions, ensures that the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew is fully compliant with the regulations. It is also consistent with our commitment to diversity.
